In fact, 19 percent of the U.S. rural (nonmetro) population is 65 years or older, compared with 15 percent in urban (metro) areas. Rural counties make up nearly 85 percent of the 1,104 “older-age counties”—those with more than 20 percent of their population age 65 or older.

More than 1 in 5 older Americans live in rural areas, many concentrated in states where more than half of their older populations are in rural areas. A new report, The Older Population in Rural America: 2012-2016, shows that 17.5% of the rural population was 65 years and older compared to 13.8% in urban areas.

Impact of rural aging. The rural population includes over 8 million people age 65+, and rural areas are older than urban ones with a greater percentage of population age 65 and over (16.2 vs. 12.6) and a higher overall median age (40.3 vs. 36.6). have fewer long-term care options.

AARP defines aging in place as “the ability to live in one’s own home and community safely, independently, and comfortably, regardless of age, income, or ability level” (Farber, et al. 2011). According to AARP, almost 90% of senior citizens’ desire to live in their homes as they age.

Aging in Place in Small Urban and Rural Communities

Community Aging in Place-Advancing Better Living for Elders (CAPABLE program)- A team consisting of a nurse, occupational therapist & handyman/contractor work together with low-income older adults in their homes to improve function and adapt the home environment to facilitate aging-in-place.
