**Guidelines Highlights | American Heart Association CPR ...**  
2 hands-on the lower half of the breastbone (sternum) Child. 2 hands or 1 hand (optional for a very small child) on the lower half of the breastbone (sternum) Infant. 1 rescuer. 2 fingers in the center of the chest, just below the nipple line. 2 or more rescuers.

**Key Numbers for CPR - Downloadable Chart AEDCPR**  
The AHA guidelines "strongly recommend" that untrained / lay responders perform "compression-only" CPR, sometimes known as CCR. However, medical professionals and trained lay people are still urged to give the victim two "rescue breaths" in between each series of 30 chest compressions. All the changes apply only to adult victims who collapse of cardiac arrest; artificial respiration is still recommended for children and for adults in a few cases, including near-drowning and drug overdose.

Why did the AHA CPR Guidelines Change? In 2010, the American Heart Association (AHA) released their 2010 Guidelines Highlights, which outlines the key changes regarding CPR procedures.The most prominent change was the rearranging of the order from A-B-C to C-A-B in the CPR sequence, emphasizing the chest compressions.. The AHA's research concluded that the old approach creates an unnecessary ...

**The Revised American Heart Association CPR Guidelines**  
Cycle 1: Performs high-quality chest compressions (initiates compressions immediately after recognition of cardiac arrest) •Correct hand placement – Lower half of the breastbone – 2-handed (second hand on top of the first) •Compression rate of 100 to 120/min – Delivers 30 compressions in 15 to 18 seconds.

The new guidelines do not have any major changes, but here are some of the basics: No more than 120 compressions per minute with a minimum of 100. Chest compressions for adults should be no more than 2.4 inches and at least 2 inches.

**New CPR and BLS American Heart Association Guidelines**  
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The high quality of compression in CPR should be at least 1/3 of the AP chest diameter, or approximately 1 1/2 inches in infants (4 cm) and 2 in children aged one to the age of teens. The compression speed should be 100-120 per minute. The return of the chest should be complete between compressions.

Ratio. The 2015 guidelines still recommend traditional CPR cycles of 30 chest compressions to two rescue breaths for one-rescuer CPR in all age groups and for two-rescuer CPR in adults. The 15:2 ratio of compressions to breaths remains in the 2015 guidelines for two-rescuer CPR for children and infants.

Each AHA writing group reviewed all relevant and current AHA guidelines for CPR and ECC 18–20 and all relevant 2020 ILCOR International Consensus on CPR and ECC Science With Treatment Recommendations evidence and recommendations 21 to determine if current guidelines should be reaffirmed, revised, or retired, or if new recommendations were needed. The new rate of chest compressions is 100 to 120 compressions, or pushes, per minute, compared to “at least 100” in previous guidelines, according to the American Heart Association. For adolescents and adults, a rescuer should push down at least 2 inches, but no more than 2.4 inches on the chest, compared to at least 2 inches in previous guidelines.
