A verb has a meaning, a person, and a tense. We use the infinitive to show only the meaning. The infinitive in Gaelic always has the particle a or a dh` in front of it (a choiseachd – to walk; a dh`òl – to drink). The infinitive does not tell you who or when.

Contents include: Pronunciation and orthography Parts of speech Derivation and composition Syntax Current estimates for the number of Scots Gaelic speakers today suggest that it is spoken by between 50,000 to 60,000 individuals primarily in the north of Scotland and in the Western Isles (e.g. Skye, Lewis, Harris). Once the third most spoken language in Canada, after English and French, Scots Gaelic is still spoken in Atlantic Canada on Cape Breton Island by 500-1000 people. Today it is seriously endangered and there are few fluent speakers.
