Vygotsky is widely regarded as the father of social constructivism for his theories surrounding social interaction and human development. They stated that, as Piaget thought, students were the creators of their own knowledge. However, Vygotsky ' s views differed when it came to how this knowledge was created.

Understanding Pedagogy - What is Social Constructivism?

Social constructivism was developed by Lev Vygotsky (1978, p. 57) who suggested that, Every function in the child's cultural development appears twice: first, on the social level and, later on, on the individual level; first, between people (interpsychological) and then inside the child (intrapsychological).

Constructivism as a Theory for Teaching and Learning ...

Constructivism in the classroom generally emphasizes active student participation in the learning process through experiment, problem solving and discussion. The teacher works to understand the students' current state of knowledge and belief, then acts as a guide, ensuring that students address the essential issues and achieve reasonable intellectual outcomes.
